The Navajo people, unlike mainstream American culture, views the land as sacred and powerful. Adrienne Benally, a Navajo woman, stated this view is also common to other indigenous peoples. In contrast, the Editor of this newsletter believes that the mainstream American environmental movement promotes care of the land as a goal that will benefit persons, not the land. Reverence for the land is part of the basis for opposition of indigenous people to projects such as pipelines, mines, and fracking.

Navajo believe that actions today will have an impact for seven generations down the line.

The Navajo nation is fortunate in that its reservation is located within its ancestral lands. Unfortunately, as is common in the U.S, the Navajo reservation is afflicted with both poverty and environmental degradation. 38% of the Navajo population lives below the poverty line. The unemployment rate is over 50%. Many households have no electricity or water. Environmental damage is caused by abandoned uranium mines, two power plants, and widespread fracking. Adrienne related that in 2015 a toxic sludge dam was breached by an EPA construction team, allowing the waste liquid to contaminate the nearby river. Although the river was heavily used by the Navajo, they were not told of the spill for a day. Adrienne gave us examples of how the Navajo are trying to care for the land. They collect environmental data such as water quality; they demonstrate against harmful construction projects such as the Dakota Access Pipeline; and they sue to uphold treaty rights to oppose environmental change.

Adrienne is assistant professor of Environmental Studies at Swarthmore College. She was originally from Shiprock, NM, on the Navajo reservation.
