# Last Meeting Summary



Rick Lee told us that when he joined the Swarthmore fire department in 1975, it was fully staffed by volunteers. There were about 60 to 70 volunteers then. Now there are about 10. Currently, most of the staff is part-time paid workers. Rick has experienced the transition in many positions of responsibility. He is currently the President of Swarthmore Fire and Protection Association and Assistant Fire Chief. Rick said the decline in the number of volunteers is not unique to Swarthmore. Nationwide, there

has been an 85% drop in volunteers at community fire departments. He said the situation in Swarthmore is aggravated by the town becoming a white-collar community. Potential volunteers leave town during the day to work. Teens who volunteer in the junior fire-fighters program leave town to go to college. The extra cost of hiring part-time fire fighters is compounded by the need for more expensive equipment. Rick explained that modern building materials emit more toxic fumes when they burn. This requires that fire fighters wear more expensive protective gear. As is the case with cars, modern fire trucks are more complicated and expensive. Unlike in the past, they cannot be maintained by the department staff. This has all resulted in a much bigger budget than when Rick first joined the department. The department got a financial boost when it established an ambulance service in 1997. Unfortunately, the increased income from the ambulance service has been more than offset by increased costs in general.

While the financial status of the fire department has been greatly helped by various federal and state grants over the years, the upkeep of the department mostly relies on contributions from townspeople and financial support from the Borough.

Rick mentioned a couple of interesting trends. One is that he expects that many of the smaller fire departments will merge together. The other is the increase in women fire fighters. He said almost half of the department are women. Good news for young girls dreaming of becoming fire persons when they grow up.

## Apparatus

Swarthmore's Company 14 is proud to present to you information on our apparatus.



This 2008 Pierce pumper is one of our newer pieces of equipment.



This is a 2001 Pierce aerial apparatus whose pre-piped ladder can extend up to 100 ft and has a 2250 gpm pump; it can carry up to 500 gallons of water and can also deliver Class A foam. It carries 1000 feet of 5-inch supply line as well as 2 preconnects of 1? 3/4 in. (200 ft long), a 2? 1/2 in. blitz line and a 100-ft trash line in front. It has 40 ft. of 1? 3/4 in. in the bucket.



### Engine 14-2

This 1992 Marion/Spartan Pumper boasts a 1500 gpm pump and can contain 750 gallons of water, 40 gallons of foam. It has preconnects of 1? 3/4 in. 150 ft long, and 500 ft of 2? 1/2 in. attack lines. It also has 1200 ft of 5 in. supply line.
