Carr explained that early humans experienced a "great leap forward" about 50,000 years ago when they moved from the interior of Africa to the coast. The coast had more food resources. More food led to the development of bigger brains. Later, early civilization developed in river valleys in the Middle East and China. The early civilizations were built on growing crops near the rivers. Growing crops, instead of hunting and gathering, produced a surplus of food. This became the basis for population increase, social hierarchies, technological development, and, ultimately, Tiktok.

Another result of having enough food (at least for those at the top of the hierarchies) was the desire for more stuff, particularly stuff that was new and unusual. This led to trade, a lot of which was on boats. Carr showed us examples of early boats, from the Phoenicians to the Greeks and Romans and then the Vikings. He said the Polynesians were amazing seafarers. They traveled across thousands of miles of the Pacific Ocean, finding the little islands they settled. He believes they discovered the American continent before Columbus.

Now for the bane. Carr said most major cities are located on ocean coasts. Sea levels are expected to rise because of global warming. He presented a map of the world showing land areas that are projected to be submerged by 2100. All of Florida and New York City are projected to be underwater. The world will survive. It will just be very, very different.
