#### Last Week's Speaker: **Kevin Browngoehl** by Mike Malone

**Dr. Kevin Browngoehl**, a Swarthmore Pediatrician, shared his experiences as a volunteer doctor in Haiti. Working with the Haiti Clinic, he travels to Haiti every 3 months for 5-7 days with supplies to help the people of Haiti who do not have access to sufficient medical care. Although he is a pediatrician, his oldest patient is 75.

Kevin shared with us pictures from his many trips that illustrate the dire situation and the people that he is helping. While he is forced to treat the symptoms, he struggles with the challenges that hamper his ability to deal with the core issues that contribute to the conditions that he treats. As an example, he treats many children for dehydration, but he is unable to address the issues that cause the dehydration. On his last visit, however, he took 800 small medicine dropper bottles. Once in Haiti, he and his nurse purchased and filled the bottles with chlorine, because one bottle of chlorine will purify 3 months' worth of water for a family of four.

I was never an Academic but I have been very lucky. I was raised by loving parents and have always gotten along with my sister. I made it through a couple of early, fast marriages relatively unscathed. Then I met the love of my life, Chris, and this is where I became really lucky.

As a stripper, I was able to work with one of the best antique restorers and dealers in the country. I was able to get my hands on 18<sup>th</sup> Century American antiques and learned not only the correct way to take off old finishes but how to replace them authentically.

After working for Howard, we moved to Anchorage, Alaska where I was able to get a job with one of only two ivory dealers approved to buy and resell newly harvested walrus ivory to indigenous Alaskans to carve or scrimshaw. He was also a dog musher so the variety of interesting folks coming through the shop was a constant delight.

We came home from Alaska and I took up full time mothering, which I loved. As our sons grew I trained as a post partum doula which readied me for being a super-grandmother. I also became the wood shop teacher at Swarthmore Presbyterian Nursery School and for the last eleven years have had a delightful time teaching "my littles" how to use sandpaper, a hammer and a hand drill.

The other job I'm doing right now is Bed and Breakfast owner. Chris and I were married in a B & B and always wanted to do this, though we really were thinking at retirement. We are both very happy we did not wait. This is a lot of work.

I've been lucky to have worked with the best in their fields and now to have my own business and to learn about and become a Rotarian.
