Fluellen teaches music at a high school in Philadelphia and at a number of local colleges. He also composes music, composing his first piece at age 11. He said he was one of four local composers who were commissioned to write the Philadelphia Community Mass. One of the members of the choir is our own George Whitfield. Where's George?



How did you become involved in the community mass? To be honest Rich, I do not recall. I may have read something about it or in working with Dr. Fluellen on another project, he mentioned it.

What were the rehearsals like? The rehearsal were very easy as we have singers of varying abilities. Where were they? Most of the rehearsals were held at the Historic African Episcopal Church of St. Thomas How often? We usually rehearsed four days per month, until we were close to a performance date, then the rehearsals were once per week. Did you find them fun or hard? I can't say that they were fun or hard. This entire project allowed me to sing. Something which I love to do. However, some of the music was challenging for a 60 year old tenor who is not a professional vocalist as it pertains to range.

How many performances were you involved in? I was involved in all of the performances including the excerpts performed in collaboration with the Philadelphia Youth Orchestra. Where? The performances were held at the Monumental Baptist Church in West Philadelphia, Historic Mother Bethel AME Church in Center City Philadelphia, The Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C., and the Mann Music Center for the Performing Arts in Philadelphia.

What was it like to perform in the Kennedy Center? Performing at the Kennedy Center was very enjoyable, but surreal in a way, because Bernstein's Mass from which the Philadelphia Mass was inspired, was commissioned by Jaqueline Kennedy for the opening of the Kennedy Center. So to put all of that history together, it was rather surreal. How about local performances? The premiere performance was the most interesting. People thought they were attending a concert, and by the end of the concert they were participating in a "good old fashioned church service". By the time the choir finished the final piece of the Mass, the Angus Dei, one could feel the Holly Spirit move in that place. As with the initial Gloria, the composer took a 16 bar blues with a gospel feel and set it with a Latin text. The Mass in its entirety is very moving.

What was your favorite part of the experience? My favorite part of the experience was its evolution. From the first rehearsal to the last performance at the Mann with full orchestral accompaniment, one could see how this "new music" had evolved. Would you do something similar again? Yes, in a heartbeat.
