SPEAKER

Rosemarie Halt is the Public Health Consultant for Delaware County. She told us about the County's response to the pandemic. Because Delaware County does not have a public health department, Chester County assumed responsibility for responding to COVID-19 in Delaware County. Chester County is doing contact tracing, testing support, data collection and analysis, public communication and providing guidance to hospitals and long-term care facilities. Rosemarie was hired as a consultant as the first step to establishing a public health department. She identified a list of problems the County is experiencing that we are all familiar with at this point. They are shortages of test kits, PPE, ventilators and federal guidance.

Rosemarie stated that Delaware County is the most populace county in the U.S. without a public health department. See below for excerpts from news sources about why this is so. She said she expects the County will have a public health department in about two years. In response to a question about why it will take so long, Rosemarie said the State has mandated a process that will take time. The process has started, at least.

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Why doesn't Delaware County have a public health department?

As the COVID-19 pandemic grips southeastern Pennsylvania, Democratic leaders in Delaware County say they hope their struggle to respond to the crisis proves, once and for all, that they need to create their own health department.

Delaware County, which has so far identified 84 positive coronavirus cases, is the biggest county in the state that doesn't have its own health department. According to county council members, it's also the biggest in the country.

"I think maybe the previous administrations were worried about the economic impact, although they never did an economic impact study to see what it would look like," said Monica Taylor, who serves as vice chair of the county council. "There was just not the political will there to push it forward."

In the first weeks after coronavirus patients were identified in Delaware and neighboring counties, officials mainly relied on the state to get updated data on new cases and to disseminate information about best practices to municipalities and businesses.

But, Taylor said, there was an important drawback to that arrangement: the state is governed by stricter privacy rules than counties are, and wasn't permitted to give county officials specific information on the location of new cases — just that they were within county lines.

Andrew Reilly, a former member of the County Council and the former chairman of the county's Republican Committee, disagreed. He said it wasn't just about money, "although it was certainly a factor."

Back in 2009, Reilly said, county leaders hired Johns Hopkins University's Bloomberg School of Public Health to survey residents on the need for a public health department and to make a recommendation. "Johns Hopkins concluded that Delaware County was better served without a full-fledged county health department," he said.

Because the issue kept coming up, Reilly said, the county rehired Johns Hopkins to do an update, the results of which are pending.

Asked whether he regrets not having pushed for a health department, Reilly said no. "I was following the advice of Johns Hopkins," he said.
