Last Meeting Summary

Our speaker, Umar Mycka, is an expert on poison ivy. He told us a history of poison ivy, some of its biology, and what we can do to control it. If we don't control it and we get a poison ivy rash, he suggested a treatment. Umar said herbicides will work on young poison ivy plants but older plants must be dug up. The best herbicides are a combination of Garlon and Escort. He suggested waiting until late spring or summer to spray.

Umar said Zanfel is the best treatment for poison ivy rash. Ann Seidman suggested, and Umar concurred, that blowing a hot hair dryer on the rash will temporarily relieve itching.

Personally, after some painful experiences, we seem to have gotten rid of poison ivy around our yard. We all know the price of poison ivy freedom is eternal vigilance. Umar's talk will help.



Compared to poison oak or sumac, poison ivy is the most common and widespread of the three popular toxic plants. Poison ivy can grow in forests, near water, and also in urban environments. It's important to learn its telltale signs so you don't accidentally come into contact with it. However, this may take some practice as poison ivy can be one tricky little transforming bugger.

Not only do its leaves change colors depending on the season, but the plant itself can grow in many forms like small shrubs, carpet-like ground coverings, or even climbing vines. In this post, we're discussing specific features you can look for on this plant to effectively identify and steer clear of it.



Poison Ivy can exists as a bush, a vine, or a single plant as shown below.



The first step in preventing contact with poison ivy is to practice recognizing it from the get-go so you'll avoid it. Luckily, there are plenty of fun little mantra's

nowadays you can memorize to help with this. A few of the most common are:

- "Leaves of three, let it be."
- "Longer middle stem, beware of them."
- "Side leaves like mittens, they'll itch like the dickens."
- "Hairy vine, no friend of mine."
- "Berries of white, best take flight."
