#### **Guests Last Meeting**

Matt Ainslie (Bill's guest) Ray Jones (Hillard's guest) service he told us about was training. Job seekers can view on-line modules on goal setting, resume building, job search strategies and many other topics. They can do mock interviews, either in person or on-line. Dr. Boone said one area his agency was particularly successful at was placing persons in entry-level technical jobs such as nursing assistant. In order to obtain work as a nursing assistant, applicants must have completed a state-approved training and certification program. Although nursing assistant is entry-level, Dr. Boone said many workers use the job to put them on the ladder to higher-level nursing jobs.

Dr. Boone recently started a new job at Career Team as Chief Officer of National Workplace Solutions. He will now be able to apply his skills and experience in worker development on a national level. There is much talk about training workers in parts of the country where factories have closed. Hopefully that will happen and Dr. Boone will be able to use his skills to help these areas recover.

## Dan Hopkins' email

I asked Dan Hopkins, the political scientist who spoke at Rotary a few weeks ago, the following question by email:

My impression from my reading is that the Republican base could be considered a Trump cult and that political division is increasing. It appears that most elected Republican officials will do anything Trump wants them to do.

He recently provided the following answer:

"In a recent survey I did of Pennsylvania voters (and these tend to be very politically engaged voters), I asked a question about whether people would rather see the Republican party nominate a 2024 candidate "more like Trump" or "more like a typical politician." The Republicans overwhelmingly wanted someone more like Trump, 81% to 9%. (I am pasting the crosstabs below.) So yes, I do think he has substantial sway with the current GOP. I may have rushed through it, but in a national survey I did, I see clear evidence that Trump came to be viewed much more positively by Republicans between 2016 and 2020. I think that this was an important element of 2020 which analysts missed: many didn't realize how much room Trump had to grow.

But at the same time, public opinion on a wide range of issues is very stable since 2016, even among Republicans. So in that sense, Trump's persuasive powers are very limited. With four years and extraordinary amounts of attention, Trump didn't move public opinion toward his views on any major issue I can find. Also, critically, Trump is not unusual in his level of intense support--in fact, Obama has stronger support among his strong supporters. I partly want to push back against narratives suggesting that Trump is somehow atypical in the bond he's built with his voters. So with respect to the political climate, that's what I was thinking of."
