In 2019, Swarthmore Borough Council passed a resolution setting a goal that Swarthmore Borough businesses and residents use 100% renewable electricity by 2030 and 100% renewable energy for all purposes by 2050. An excerpt from this resolution is included below. The Borough Council

Guests Last Meeting

Patrick Gunnin Deb Hansen formed a committee, led by our speaker, Phil Coleman, to provide guidance in achieving the goal. Phil called the goal zero-carbon. Phil Coleman is an expert on developing energy conservation programs for the U.S. Department of Energy. He has been putting his knowledge to use here in Swarthmore. In 2010, Phil co-founded aFewSteps. This group was founded to raise energy awareness in the residents of Swarthmore, Rose Valley, Nether Providence, and Rutledge. Phil asked Rotarians for their help. He said Borough Council asked his committee to focus on two pathways to achieve zero-carbon. One is education, the other is infrastructure projects. While aFewSteps and other groups have been working hard to educate the public, his committee has not yet decided on a new infrastructure project. The Borough has already taken a lot of steps to reduce non-renewable electricity usage. The Borough has installed solar panels on the roof of Borough hall. Most street lights are energy-saving LED lamps. Any ideas would be appreciated. Rotarians can also help by volunteering to conduct energy conservation workshops and home audits. #5 Use LED Lighting Now there's no excuse for using incandescents. Inexpensive LEDs are available for all sizes and styles.

#6 Control Your Stormwater Watch what you send into our streams.

#7 Reduce, Reuse, Recycle Take advantage of the shared economy. Avoid styrofoam and clamshells.
